

- Structure the presentation of the Chapter
- Analyze the book in detail




### **Big Picture in Sight**

Read the Introduction and Conclusion

Ask, what is the point of the chapter?

Ask, what does the author want you to do or think? (Find this in the conclusion)




# Structure the presentation of the Chapter

Now scan the chapter:

Read only the headings and subheadings

Bold face/Italicized

Read first sentences



### Analyze the book in detail


Take time reading the Introduction and concluding paragraphs of every sub-section.

Read the body with speed, not getting caught up with the details.

Use a pencil/pen to underline important aspects of the chapter.

Circle areas that are confusing or need clarification.

Box terms that are important, or write "term" in the margin.
